Additionally, beginning with the 2021 breeding season, KYSS will offer a Stallion Bonus program. Any horse that resulted from a stallion standing in Kentucky and a mare residing in Kentucky for 180 days, as well as nominated to the program, is eligible to receive a 50% bonus if finishing 1st-5th in all legs and the finals of the Championship and Commonwealth Series Programs.



The Panel also recommends continuing to support harness racing at County Fairs through the KY-Proud Series by providing up to seven events and a Final with purses of \$1,000 per entry, per division, for each event and \$15,000 for the Finals.

In 2018 & 2019, the racing commission, in partnership with several other local entities, promoted the Championships with a family-friendly festival to introduce the community to not only harness racing but equine charities, multiple breeds living in the Commonwealth, local artist and live music. This was approved for 2020 but cancelled due to COVID-19.

KRS 230.770 in part states, "money distributed from the development fund to licensed Standardbred race tracks within the Commonwealth shall be used exclusively to promote races and provide purses...."

In accordance with KRS 230.770, the KYSS Advisory Panel respectfully request the Commission's approval to continue to promote and grow the 2021 KYSS Championships with total expenditures up to \$150,000.

The following is a brief description of the KYSS and funding for informational purposes: The Kentucky Sire Stakes is a culmination of a 8 week series of preliminary races, with the biggest money earners getting a chance to compete in the Championships at The Red Mile. The series includes two-and-three year-old pacers and trotters for both fillies & colts.

#### **Kentucky Standardbred Development Fund (KSDF):**

This fund is to promote races and to provide purses for races for Kentucky-bred Standardbred horses. The fund is to be distributed to persons, corporations or associations operating licensed Standardbred race tracks within Kentucky on an equitable basis, for the purposes of conducting separate races for two and three-year-old fillies and colts, both trotting and pacing. The KSDF receives its revenue under the provisions of KRS 138.510, taxes on pari-mutuel wagering.

#### **Kentucky Standardbred Breeders' Incentive Fund (KSBIF):**

The Kentucky Standardbred Breeders' Incentive Fund is financed from the 13% of all receipts collected from the sales and use tax on the fees paid for breeding a stallion to a mare in Kentucky, together with any other money contributed, appropriated, or allocated to the fund from all other sources. The money deposited in the KSBIF is used to provide rewards for breeders or owners of Kentucky-bred Standardbred horses.

The Kentucky Horse Racing Commission has received the attached request from Richard Riedel seeking transfer of funds from the unclaimed pari-mutuel tickets to the Kentucky Racing Health and Welfare Fund. This total amount is \$1,968,447 less any claims and advertising.

The below documents follow this memorandum:

- Letter from Richard Riedel seeking transfer of funds;
- · Chart reflecting dollars due the fund;
- Chart reflecting dollars paid to fund;
- Approval of the release of funds from the Kentucky State Auditor;
- Copy of the Kentucky Racing Health and Welfare Fund audit report for 2019 prepared by Monroe Shine.

Pursuant, to KRS 230.362, any reported pari-mutuel ticket that has not been claimed within one (1) year from the time the ticket became payable is presumed to be abandoned. Each year, any person or association holding any unclaimed tickets presumed abandoned as of July 1st of that year (in other words, any person holding on July 1st any tickets that have not, as of that date, been claimed for a year or more) is required to create a list of the tickets. The list, which records the amount of each ticket, is then submitted to the Commission by September 1st of the same year. Between November 1st and November 15th, the person or association then turns over to the Commission the sum represented by the tickets as reported.

The tickets turned over to the Kentucky Racing Health and Welfare Fund are over a year old. Specifically, these are tickets that were originally sold to bettors between July 1, 2018, and June 30, 2019, and were still unclaimed a year (or more) later on July 1, 2020. Below is a copy of the statute regarding payments to the Kentucky Racing Health and Welfare Fund, Inc.



### 230.374 Payments to Kentucky Racing Health and Welfare Fund, Inc.

All sums reported and paid to the authority under the provisions of KRS 230.361 to 230.373, with the exception of funds paid under KRS 230.398, shall be paid by the

authority to the Kentucky Racing Health and Welfare Fund, Inc., a nonprofit charitable corporation, organized for the benefit, aid, assistance, and relief of thoroughbred owners, trainers, jockeys, valets, exercise riders, grooms, stable attendants, pari-mutuel clerks, and other thoroughbred racing personnel employed in connection with racing, and their spouses and children, who can demonstrate their need for financial assistance connected with death, illness, or off-the-job injury and are not otherwise covered by union health and welfare plans, workers' compensation, Social Security, public welfare, or any type of health, medical, death, or accident insurance. These sums shall be paid on or before December 31 in each year, however, no payments shall be made by the authority to the Kentucky Racing Health and Welfare Fund, Inc., unless the authority and the Auditor of Public Accounts are satisfied that the fund is in all respects being operated for the charitable and benevolent purposes as set forth in this section and that no part of the funds paid to the fund by the authority or any net earnings of the fund inure to the benefit of any private individual, director, officer, or member of the fund or any of the persons who turned over sums to the authority representing unclaimed pari-mutuel tickets.

The following is a brief description of the fund for informational purposes.

Kentucky Racing Health and Welfare Fund. The Kentucky Racing Health and Welfare Fund, Inc. is an independent charitable corporation, organized for the benefit, aid, assistance and relief of thoroughbred owners, trainers, jockeys, valets, exercise riders, grooms, stable attendants, pari-mutuel clerks and other thoroughbred racing personnel employed in connection with racing, and their spouses and children, who can demonstrate their need for financial assistance connected with death, illness or off-the-job injury and are not otherwise covered by union health and welfare plans, workers' compensation, Social Security, public welfare or any type of health, medical, death or accident insurance. Proceeds from unclaimed pari-mutuel tickets provide the revenue for this fund.

### (1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### **Nature of Operations**

The Kentucky Racing Health and Welfare Fund, Inc., (Fund) a non-profit charitable corporation, was formed in 1978 pursuant to KRS 230.374.

The Fund is organized for the benefit, aid, assistance and relief of owners, trainers, jockeys, valets, exercise riders, grooms, stable attendants, pari-mutuel clerks and other racing personnel employed in connection with thoroughbred racing and their spouses and children who demonstrate need for financial assistance connected with death, illness, off-the-job injury and are not otherwise covered by union health and welfare plans, workers' compensation, social security, public welfare or any type of health, medical, death or accident insurance.

Pursuant to KRS 230.374 the Fund receives an annual grant which represents uncashed thoroughbred pari-mutuel tickets. No payment is made to the Fund unless the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission and the Kentucky Auditor of Public Accounts are satisfied the Fund is, in all respects, operated for the charitable and benevolent purposes set forth in KRS 230.374 and 230.375 and no part of the grant paid to the Fund or any net earnings of the Fund inure to the benefit of any individual, director, officer, member of the Fund, or persons who turned over sums to the Commission representing unclaimed pari-mutuel tickets. These payments are restricted by law and are only available for use as set forth in KRS 230.374 and 230.375.

The Fund sponsors the Kentucky Race Track Retirement Plan. The Plan, with discretionary contributions, was established pursuant to KRS 230.375 and is administered for the benefit of eligible participants.

#### Basis of Presentation

These financial statements are presented on the modified cash basis of accounting, another comprehensive basis of accounting. The modified cash basis of accounting incorporates elements of both the cash basis of accounting and generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). Consequently, revenues are recognized when received and certain expenses and purchases of assets are recognized when cash is disbursed. Depreciation of property and equipment is reported in the financial statements.

The primary differences between the Fund's modified cash basis of accounting and GAAP relates to the recognition of liabilities for claims incurred in one year and paid in the next and disclosure of expenses by natural and functional classification. GAAP would recognize the liability and expense when incurred whereas the modified cash basis recognizes the expense when paid. Management has concluded determining the amount of these claims and the associated expense is an undue administrative burden, speculative and would provide minimal additional financial information.

Management has concluded the modified cash basis of accounting provides an accurate reflection of the Fund's economic activity and operations, accommodates the preparation of operating budgets, internal and external financial statements and facilitates the comparison of budgets to financial statements.

### (1 - continued)

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board which requires the Fund to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets: net assets with donor restrictions and net assets without donor restrictions.

Certain prior year accounts have been reclassified to conform with current year presentations.

### Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Fund considers all cash accounts, which are not subject to withdrawal restrictions or penalties, and all highly liquid debt instruments purchased with a maturity date of three months or less to be cash and cash equivalents in the financial statements.

### Investments

Investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values are measured at fair market value in the statement of net assets. The unrealized gains or losses on investments are included in the change in net assets. Gains and losses on the marketable securities are determined based upon the specific securities sold.

### Mortgage Notes Receivable

Mortgage notes receivable are carried at their estimated collectable amounts. Interest income on mortgage notes receivable is recognized using the cash method. Interest income on impaired loans is recognized as cash is collected or on a cost-recovery basis. Provisions for losses on mortgage notes receivable are determined on the basis of loss experience, known and inherent risks, the estimated value of underlying collateral, and current economic conditions.

### Concentration of Credit Risk

The Fund maintains its cash at financial institutions and at times the balances may be in excess of federally insured limits. At December 31, 2019, the Fund had \$28,139 of funds in excess of insured limits.

### Use of Estimates

The Fund uses estimates and assumptions in preparing these financial statements in accordance with its modified cash basis of accounting. These estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and the reported expenses, primarily the capitalization and depreciation of long-lived assets. Actual results could vary from the estimates that were used.

### Change in Accounting Principle

On January 1, 2019, the Fund adopted Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2014-09, Revenue from Contracts with Customers (Topic 606), (ASU 2014-09) and FASB ASU 2018-08, Not-For-Profit Entities (Topic 958): Clarifying the Scope and the Accounting Guidance for Contributions Received and Contributions Made (ASU 2018-08).

### (1 - continued)

These two ASUs were adopted together as of January 1, 2019, because they both establish standards for characterizing grants and similar contracts with resource providers as either exchange transactions or conditional contributions. ASU 2014-09 was adopted retrospectively only to agreements that were not completed at January 1, 2019. ASU 2018-08 was applied on a modified prospective basis to agreements that were not completed January 1, 2019, or that were entered into after that date. The adoption did not have a material impact on the timing of revenue recognition as of the adoption date and did not result in a cumulative effect adjustment to net assets.

### **Expense Allocation**

Directly identifiable expenses are charged to programs and supporting services. Expenses related to more than one function are charged to programs and supporting services on the basis of periodic time and expense studies. Management and general expenses include those expenses that are not directly identifiable with any other specific function but provide for the overall support and direction of the Foundation.

#### Income Taxes

The Fund is exempt from federal and state income taxes under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Accordingly, the financial statements do not provide for income taxes.

The Fund has implemented the accounting guidance for uncertainty in income taxes. Under that guidance, tax positions need to be recognized in the financial statements when it is more-likely-than-not the position will be sustained upon examination by the tax authorities. As of December 31, 2019, the Fund has no uncertain tax positions that qualify for either recognition or disclosure in the financial statements. The Fund files a federal Form 990. The Fund is not currently being examined and management believes its tax-exempt status would be upheld under examination.

### (2) LIQUIDITY

As part of the Organization's liquidity management, it has a policy to structure its financial assets to be available as its general expenditures, liabilities, and other obligations come due. In addition, the Organization invests cash in excess of daily requirements in short-term investments such as marketable securities.

The Fund holds the above securities, invested in a designated operating reserve account, to ensure its ability to continue operations as set forth in KRS 230.374 and 230.375. In recent years, the Fund's annual budgeted expenditures have exceeded the grants received from uncashed pari-mutuel tickets. The Fund's board of directors and management consider this operating reserve and the related income generated, necessary to continue the operations of the Fund. The operating reserve investment helps management continue to provide health and welfare benefits despite the uncertainty about the amounts and timing of the grants received and benefits provided.

### (4) FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

The Fund adopted the provisions of ASC 820 Fair Value Measurements, for financial assets and financial liabilities. The Fund has no nonfinancial assets and nonfinancial liabilities determined at fair value.

ASC 820 defines fair value as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. ASC 820 establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the use of inputs used in valuation methodologies into the following three levels:

(4 - continued)

- Level 1: Inputs to the valuation methodology are quoted prices, unadjusted for identical assets or liabilities in active markets. A quoted market price in an active market provides the most reliable evidence of fair value and shall be used to measure fair value whenever available.
- Level 2: Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted market prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets; inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted market prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active; or inputs to the valuation methodology that are derived principally from or can be corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.
- Level 3: Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement. Level 3 assets and liabilities include financial instruments whose value is determined using discounted cash flow methodologies, as well as instruments for which the determination of fair value requires significant management judgment or estimation.

A description of the valuation methodology used for instruments measured at fair value, as well as the general classification of such instruments pursuant to the valuation hierarchy, is set forth below. Marketable securities. Marketable securities are reported at fair value on a recurring basis. These securities are classified as Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy where quoted market prices from reputable third-party brokers are available in an active market. If quoted market prices are not available, the Fund obtains fair value measurements from independent pricing services. The Company's valuation methodologies may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. While management believes the Company's valuation methodologies are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different estimate of fair value at the reporting date.

### (5) RELATED PARTY MORTGAGE NOTES AND ADVANCES

The Fund advanced cash to The Old School, LLC and Back Track, Inc. These entities are related parties with members common to both boards of directors. The advances were for operations, the purchase and renovation of a building, and payment of professional fees. During June 2019, the non-interest bearing note secured by a 2<sup>nd</sup> real estate mortgage was extended to May 1, 2021. At December 31, 2019 and 2018, unpaid advances amounted to \$1,889,546 to The Old School, LLC, respectively. At December 31, 2019 and 2018, unpaid advances amounted to \$4,505 to Back Track, Inc.

### (6) OPERATING LEASE AND SUBLEASE

The Fund leases office space from The Old School, LLC. The initial term of the lease expired during 2019 and was extended through October 1, 2020 with fourteen additional one year renewal options.

### (6 - continued)

Rent paid under the lease amounted to \$5,976 per month during the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018. The lease agreement also contains a provision which requires the Fund to reimburse The Old School, LLC for its share of certain expenses. During the year ended December 31, 2018, the Fund reimbursed The Old School \$13,000 for HVAC repair expenses. Total rent expense for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018 was \$71,710. For the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018, \$35,855 was allocated to the Kentucky Racing Health Services Center and \$48,855 was reported as an administrative cost.

The Fund uses a portion of the leased space for its offices and subleases the remaining space. The Fund leased a portion of its space to a tenant during the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018 for \$325 per month. The lease expired March 31, 2019. Total rent received under this sublease for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018 was \$5,200 and \$3,250, respectively.

### (7) KENTUCKY RACE TRACK RETIREMENT PLAN

The Kentucky Race Track Retirement Plan is funded with discretionary contributions from the Fund. Contributions to the Plan were \$250,000 for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018. The Fund also paid related administration expenses for the Plan of \$7,910 and \$7,667 for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

### (8) EMPLOYEE RETIREMENT PLAN

The Fund has a simplified employee retirement plan for all full time employees with over three years of service. The Fund's contribution equals 8% of the participant's compensation. The Fund's contributions to the plan amounted to \$19,387 and \$18,921 for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

### (9) DEVELOPER FEE RECEIVABLE

In 2002, the Fund entered into a development agreement with The Old School, LLC to supervise the rehabilitation of the building owned by The Old School, LLC. The development agreement required The Old School, LLC to pay the Fund a development fee in the amount of \$743,681. The remaining unpaid balance of \$320,252 is evidenced by an unsecured note payable to the Fund. This note carries an interest rate of 6.0% and is due May 1, 2021 with interest.

### (10) SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

In preparing these financial statements, the Fund has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure in the accompanying financial statements and related notes thereto have taken place through July 30, 2020.

The Fund received grants of uncashed pari-mutuel tickets totaling \$1,880,301 in January and February of 2020.

As of July 30, 2020, the Fund is in the process of implementing a risk mitigation strategy related to the impact of COVID-19 covering all aspects of the Fund's operations. The grants received by the Fund represent uncashed thoroughbred pari-mutuel tickets. Due to COVID-19, thoroughbred racing events are being held without live spectators and are not currently generating uncashed pari-mutuel tickets. Contributions will be diminished in 2021 and any other future periods affected by the pandemic. The Fund's impact mitigation strategy includes future decreases in benefits and other grants, if necessary, as well as the use of operating reserves to maintain program services.

The Fund received \$71,000 in funding through a loan under the Small Business Administration's Paycheck Protection Program in May 2020. The unsecured loan has a maturity of two years, an interest rate of 1% and loan payments will be deferred for six months. The loan may be partially or fully forgiven if the funds are used for payroll costs, interest on mortgages, rent and utilities.

KHRC staff members, Commissioner Hendrickson, Commissioner Kling, and Commission Simendinger have reviewed all three (3) applications. The following is a summary of their findings:

### Amtote International, Inc. ("Amtote")

Re: Ratification of Executive Director Approval of Oak Grove's Revised 2020 Race Dates

In its application for a 2020 license, WKY Development, LLC ("Oak Grove") sought and received an award of 16 race dates for its facility in Oak Grove, Kentucky, as follows:

- October 14, 15, 19, 20, 21, 22, 26, 27, 28, 29
- November 2, 3, 4, 9, 10, 11

On October 22, 2020, Oak Grove requested approval to amend Section R of its 2020 Application, which describes the Racing and Wagering Operations. A copy of that request is included in the materials after this memorandum. Specifically, Oak Grove requests to change its Racing Days in the following respects:

Cancel racing: Monday, October 26

Tuesday, October 27 Wednesday, October 28

Reschedule for: Saturday, November 21

Sunday, November 22 Monday, November 23

Of note, the request does not seek to alter the number of race dates in any way. Instead, the request seeks to shift the three dates in October 2020, which were lost due to inclement weather, to three dates in November 2020.

The full Commission did not have time to review and vote on the request before the proposed race dates. Therefore, Marc Guilfoil conditionally granted Oak Grove's request, subject to ratification by the full Commission.



### The Commission may approve shifted race dates.

Per my review of Kentucky statutes and regulations, nothing prohibits the Commission from approving a shift in live race meeting dates and host track status. Although the award of additional race dates to a track after the November 1 deadline is not allowed under KRS 230.300(5), except in limited circumstances, that is not what Oak Grove seeks. Instead, Oak Grove seeks only to shift dates that have already been awarded.

Although such requests have been infrequent, the Commission has traditionally allowed race dates to be shifted if the request is received and approved before the racing on the date is held.<sup>1</sup> Such an action does not constitute the "award" of race dates and thus is not barred by the November 1 deadline in KRS 230.300.

The concern that drives the statutory time limit on awarding race dates—"to prevent ongoing battles for dates," 1978-79 Ky. Op. Att'y Gen. 2-538 (1979) is not present here. Oak Grove has already been awarded sixteen (16) days of racing in 2020 and the shifted days will fall within the same general period (mid-October to mid-November 2020) as the dates that were originally awarded. Also, the shifted dates will not conflict with those held by another harness track. The shifted dates conflict with one (1) Thoroughbred track date. However, the Commission has traditionally allowed overlap between Standardbred and Thoroughbred tracks. Moreover, the owner of the affected Thoroughbred track, Churchill Downs, is part-owner of Oak Grove, and thus appears to have no objection.

Ratification of Executive Director Approval of Request from Churchill Downs Racetrack to Convert Noncontiguous Track Re:

Extension Facility into Simulcast Facility

On June 18, 2019, the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission (KHRC) unanimously approved a request from Churchill Downs Racetrack (Churchill Downs) to operate a noncontiguous track extension facility at the Louisville Thoroughbred Society, located at 209 E. Main St., #200, Louisville, KY 40202, pursuant to KRS 230.210(22). That unanimous approval was contingent upon the receipt of satisfactory background checks for the following principals/members of Louisville Thoroughbred Society, LLC (LTS):

- Gene McLean;
- Mike Schnell; and
- David Steinbrecher.

In the time since that approval was provided, the KHRC staff has received completed, acceptable background checks on each of the above-referenced LTS principals/members. As such, the KHRC's prior approval is no longer conditional, but is instead fully effective, without any contingencies.

However, on October 21, 2020, KHRC Executive Director Marc Guilfoil received a request from Churchill Downs to convert this noncontiguous track extension facility into a simulcast facility, effective January 1, 2021, consistent with the terms of KRS 230.380 and 810 KAR 3:050. That request was conditionally approved by Executive Director Guilfoil on the same date, in accordance with the terms of KRS 230.230(1). The expeditious nature of Executive Director Guilfoil's conditional approval was necessary in order to ensure that the facility could open and operate in a timely fashion. Furthermore, the KHRC staff recommended that such conditional approval be provided, because Churchill Downs had already submitted the information required of simulcast facilities pursuant to 810 KAR 3:050(1)(7)(a)-(m).

The KHRC is now asked to ratify the conditional approval provided by Executive Director Guilfoil, and the KHRC staff recommends ratification.

In its application for a 2021 license, Turfway Park, LLC ("Turfway Park") sought and received an award of 2021 Winter/Spring racing dates for its facility in Florence, Kentucky, as follows:

February 5, 6, 7, 12, 13, 14, 19, 20, 21, 26, 27, 28 (with optional dates for February 4, 11, 18, 25); and

March 5, 6, 7, 12, 13, 14, 19, 20, 21, 26, 27, 28 (with optional dates for March 4, 11, 18, and 25).

On November 17, 2020, Turfway Park requested approval to amend Section R of its 2021 Application, which describes Racing and Wagering Operations. A copy of that request is included in the materials after this memorandum. Specifically, Turfway Park requests to shift the above-referenced dates as follows, due to a temporary hold on its 2021 construction schedule:

January 1, 2, 6, 7, 8, 9, 14, 15, 16, 21, 22, 23, 28, 29, 30 (with optional dates for January 13, 20, 27);

February 4, 5, 6, 11, 12, 13, 18, 19, 20, 25, 26, 27 (with optional dates for February 3, 10, 17, 24); and

March 4, 5, 6, 11, 12, 13, 18, 19, 20, 25, 26, 27 (with optional dates for March 3, 10, 17, and 24).

All race times will be set for 6:15 p.m. Of note, the request does not seek to alter the number of race dates in any way. The Commission has legal authority to approve these changes and the KHRC staff recommends approval.

### The Commission may approve shifted race dates.

Per my review of Kentucky statutes and regulations, nothing prohibits the Commission from approving a shift in live race meeting dates and host track status. Although the award of additional race dates to a track after the November 1 deadline is not



allowed under KRS 230.300(5), except in limited circumstances, <sup>1</sup> that is not what Turfway Park seeks. Instead, Turfway Park seeks only to shift dates that have already been awarded.

Although such requests have been infrequent, the Commission has traditionally allowed race dates to be shifted if the request is received and approved before racing on the date in question is held.<sup>2</sup> Such an action does not constitute the "award" of race dates and thus is not barred by the November 1 deadline in KRS 230.300.

The concern that drives the statutory time limit on awarding race dates—"to prevent ongoing battles for dates," 1978-79 Ky. Op. Att'y Gen. 2-538 (1979)—is not present here. Turfway Park has already been awarded thirty-nine (39) days of racing for January, February, and March of 2021, and the shifted days will fall within the same months as the dates that were originally awarded. In addition, the shifted dates will not conflict with those held by another Thoroughbred track, and are supported by Marty Maline, the Executive Director for the Kentucky Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association.

### The Commission may approve race time changes.

810 KAR 4:040 Section 1 states that the Commission shall approve the post time for the first race on each racing day. Nothing prohibits the Commission from approving an amended post time.

Re: Proposed agency amendment to 811 KAR 2:120: Kentucky Horse Breeders' Incentive Fund

On September 9, 2020, KHRC staff filed technical amendments to 811 KAR 2:120: Kentucky Horse Breeders' Incentive Fund ("KHBIF"). These amendments were filed solely to keep the regulation from expiring pursuant to KRS 13A.3102.

While these amendments have been pending, KHRC employees have worked with the regulated community to develop substantive amendments that would benefit the program.

KHRC staff seek Commission approval to include these changes in an agency amendment to the regulation. The regulated community will have an opportunity to participate in streamlined notice and comment procedures.

The two (2) major changes to this regulation are as follows:

- The KHBIF regulation originally required a letter from the national breed organization representing the breed certifying the number of horses twenty-five (25) years of age and younger in the breed residing in Kentucky. The proposed amendments state that if the Kentucky affiliate is the national breed organization, then an independent third party approved by the Commission must certify the number of horses. If the Kentucky affiliate demonstrates that it cannot obtain an independent third party to certify horse numbers, then the Commission staff may certify horse numbers at a fee of \$120.00 per hour.
- For a horse to be included in the certification, the horse must be the result of parentage verified by DNA verification of
  either the horse's sire or dam. A three-generation pedigree on one side must be displayed on the certificate of registration,
  such that the horse, at least one of the horse's parents, and at least one set of the horse's grandparents are displayed on
  the certificate.

Other notable changes include, but are not limited to, the following:

- "Show horse" is defined as a horse that participates in judged exhibition competitions.
- Kentucky affiliates must have an IRS 501(c) designation.



- At least one member of the KHBIF advisory committee must have "established knowledge of gaited horses."
- Each horse shall be registered with only one (1) affiliate. This has been the KHBIF's practice for some time, but it is now codified in the regulation.
- Discipline will take place according to 810 KAR 7:070, with only a few exceptions.
- Deadlines include:
  - The Commission has to notify the Kentucky affiliate of the total dollars allotted to the affiliate by March 1 of each vear.
  - The affiliate must notify the Commission of its incentive winners by October 1 of each year. It must also notify the Commission of the names of its registered horses and the date of each horse's registration.
  - The Commission must generate claim forms for the appropriate Kentucky affiliate within thirty (30) calendar days of receiving the incentive winners' names.
  - The affiliate must provide the claim forms to its incentive winners and certify that it has notified all incentive winners of their awards.
  - o The Commission shall not issue an award check to any incentive winners prior to receiving that letter.

Re: Proposed amendments to 810 KAR 8:010, 020, and 040

On Tuesday, December 1, 2020, the Equine Drug Research Counsel ("EDRC") approved regulatory amendments related to the KHRC's regulatory treatment of clenbuterol:

The major recommended changes to our regulations are as follows:

- 810 KAR 8:010 should be revised to create a new section regarding clenbuterol. That section will specify that clenbuterol is prohibited unless certain conditions are met. Those conditions include, but are not limited to:
  - o The prescription for clenbuterol is made for a specific horse based upon a specific diagnosis.
  - The veterinarian must provide a copy of the horse's treatment sheet to the Equine Medical Director or his/her designee for review within 24 hours of any clenbuterol administration.
  - A horse administered clenbuterol must be placed on the veterinarian's list for a minimum of twenty-one (21) days after its last administration. The horse must meet all conditions for removal from the list, including blood and urine sampling after the 21-day period. Both samples must have no detectible clenbuterol.
- 810 KAR 8:020 should be revised to state that the acceptable threshold level of clenbuterol is the level of detection in urine, serum, and plasma;
- 810 KAR 8:040 should be revised to state that clenbuterol may be administered if the treatment is pursuant to a prescription, timely reported to the Commission, and otherwise compliant with 810 KAR 8:010.

Draft amendments to our regulations are attached to this memorandum.

- prescribing conditions under which all legitimate horse racing and wagering thereon is conducted
- in Kentucky. KRS 230.240(2) requires the commission to promulgate administrative regulations
- restricting or prohibiting the administration of drugs or stimulants or other improper acts to
- 14 horses prior to the horse participating in a race. This administrative regulation establishes
- 15 requirements and controls in the administration of drugs, medications, and substances to horses,
- 16 governs certain prohibited practices, and establishes trainer responsibilities relating to the health
- 17 and fitness of horses.
- 18 Section 1. Definitions.
- 19 (1) "AAS" or "anabolic steroid" means an anabolic androgenic steroid.

- 1 (2) "Administer" means to apply to or cause the introduction of a substance into the body 2 of a horse.
  - (3) "Commission laboratory" means a laboratory chosen by the commission to test biologic specimens from horses taken under the supervision of the commission veterinarian.
  - (4) "Location under the jurisdiction of the commission" means a licensed race track or a training center as described in KRS 230.260(5).
  - (5) "Positive finding" means the commission laboratory has conducted testing and determined that a drug, medication, or substance, the use of which is restricted or prohibited by this administrative regulation, 810 KAR 8:020, or 810 KAR 8:040, was present in the sample.
  - (a) For the drugs, medications, or substances listed in this administrative regulation or 810 KAR 8:020 for which an established concentration level is provided, it shall be necessary to have a finding in excess of the established concentration level as provided for the finding to be considered a positive finding.
    - (b) Positive finding also includes:

- 1. Substances present in the horse in excess of concentrations at which the substances could occur naturally; and
  - 2. Substances foreign to a horse that cause interference with testing procedures.
- (6) "Primary sample" means the primary sample portion of the biologic specimen taken under the supervision of the commission veterinarian to be tested by the commission laboratory.
- (7) "Split sample" means the split sample portion of the biologic specimen taken under the supervision of the commission veterinarian to be tested by the split sample laboratory.

- (8) "Split sample laboratory" means the laboratory approved by the commission to test the split sample portion of the biologic specimen from horses taken under the supervision of the commission veterinarian.
  - (9) "Test barn" means a fenced enclosure sufficient in size and facilities to accommodate the stabling of horses temporarily detained for obtaining biologic specimens for testing.
- 6 Section 2. Use of Medication.

- (1) Therapeutic measures and medication necessary to improve or protect the health of a horse shall be administered to a horse in training under the direction of a licensed veterinarian.
- (2) Except as expressly permitted in 810 KAR Chapter 8, while participating in a race (betting or non-betting), qualifying race, or time trial, it shall be a violation for a horse to carry in its body any drug, medication, substance, or metabolic derivative, that:
  - (a) Is foreign to the horse; or
  - (b) Might mask the presence of a prohibited drug, or obstruct testing procedures.
- (3) It shall be a violation for therapeutic medications to be present in excess of established threshold concentrations established in this administrative regulation or in 810 KAR 8:020. The thresholds for permitted NSAIDs are established in Section 8 of this administrative regulation.
- (4) Except as provided by paragraphs (a), (b), and (c) of this subsection, it shall be a violation for a substance to be present in a horse in excess of a concentration at which the substance could occur naturally. It shall be the responsibility of the commission to prove that the substance was in excess of normal concentration levels.
- (a) Gamma amino butyric acid shall not be present in a concentration greater than 110 nanograms per milliliter in serum or plasma.

- (b) Cobalt shall not be present in a concentration greater than twenty-five (25) parts per
   billion in serum or plasma.
- (c) Free prednisolone shall not be present in a concentration greater than ten (10)
   nanograms per milliliter in urine.
  - (5) It shall be prima facie evidence that a horse was administered and carried, while running in a race (betting or non-betting), qualifying race, or time trial, a drug, medication, substance, or metabolic derivative thereof prohibited by this section if:
  - (a) A biologic specimen from the horse was taken under the supervision of the commission veterinarian promptly after a horse ran in a race (betting or non-betting), qualifying race, or time trial; and
    - (b) The commission laboratory presents to the commission a report of a positive finding.
  - (6) The commission shall utilize the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission Uniform Drug, Medication, and Substance Classification Schedule as provided in 810 KAR 8:020, for classification of drugs, medications, and substances violating this administrative regulation. Penalties for violations of this administrative regulation shall be implemented in accordance with 810 KAR 8:030.
    - Section 3. Treatment Restrictions.

(1) Except as provided in Section 4 of this administrative regulation, only a veterinarian licensed to practice veterinary medicine in Kentucky and licensed by the commission shall administer by injection a prescription or controlled drug, medication, or other substance to a horse at a location under the jurisdiction of the commission.

(2) The only injectable substance allowed within twenty-four (24) hours prior to post time of the race in which the horse is entered shall be furosemide, as established in Section 6 of this administrative regulation.

- (3) Except as provided by subsection (5) of this section, only a veterinarian licensed to practice veterinary medicine in Kentucky and licensed by the commission may possess a hypodermic needle, syringe, or injectable of any kind at a location under the jurisdiction of the commission.
- (4) A veterinarian licensed to practice veterinary medicine in Kentucky and licensed by the commission shall use only single-use disposable needles and syringes, and shall dispose of them in a container approved by the commission veterinarian.
- (5) If a person regulated by the commission has a medical condition that makes it necessary to possess a needle and syringe at a location under the jurisdiction of the commission, the person shall request prior permission from the stewards or judges and furnish a letter from a licensed physician explaining why it is necessary for the person to possess a needle and syringe. The stewards or judges may grant approval for a person to possess and use a needle and syringe at a location under the jurisdiction of the commission, but may also establish necessary restrictions and limitations.
- (6) A commission employee may accompany a veterinarian at a location under the jurisdiction of the commission and take possession of a syringe, needle, or other device used to administer a substance to a horse.
- (7) Electronic therapeutic treatments, other than nebulization, shall not be administered to a horse within twenty-four (24) hours prior to post time of a race in which the horse is entered.

- Section 4. Certain Permitted Substances. Liniments, antiseptics, antibiotics, ointments,
- leg paints, washes, and other products commonly used in the daily care of horses may be
- administered by a person, other than a licensed veterinarian if:
- 4 (1) The treatment does not include any drug, medication, or substance otherwise
- 5 prohibited by this administrative regulation;
- 6 (2) The treatment is not injected; and
- 7 (3) The person is acting under the direction of a licensed trainer or veterinarian licensed
- 8 to practice veterinary medicine in Kentucky and licensed by the commission.
- 9 Section 5. Anti-ulcer Medications.
- The following anti-ulcer medications may be administered orally, at the dosage stated in
- this section, up to twenty-four (24) hours prior to post time of the race in which the horse is
- 12 entered:
- (1) Cimetidine (Tagamet): eight (8) to twenty (20) milligrams per kilogram;
- (2) Omeprazole (Gastrogard): two and two-tenths (2.2) grams;
- 15 (3) Ranitidine (Zantac): eight (8) milligrams per kilogram; and
- 16 (4) Sucralfate: two (2) to four (4) grams.
- 17 Section 6. Furosemide Use on Race Day.
- (1) Furosemide may be administered, in accordance with this section, to a horse that
- is entered to compete in a race, qualifying race, or time trial, except as provided in subsection (6)
- of this section.
- 21 (2) Furosemide shall only be administered prior to a race, qualifying race, or time trial by:
- 22 (a) The commission veterinarian; or

(b) A licensed veterinarian approved by the commission to perform the administration if the commission veterinarian is unavailable. If the furosemide is administered by an approved licensed veterinarian, the administering veterinarian shall provide a written report to the commission veterinarian no later than two (2) hours prior to post time of the race in which the horse receiving the furosemide is competing.

- (3) Except as provided in subsection (6) of this section, furosemide may be used if administered:
- 8 (a) At a location under the jurisdiction of the commission where the horse is scheduled to 9 race;
  - (b) By a single intravenous injection, not less than four (4) hours prior to post time for the race, qualifying race, or time trial in which the horse is entered; and
    - (c) In a dosage not less than 150 milligrams and not more than 500 milligrams.
  - (4) The specific gravity of a post-race urine sample shall not be below one and one one-hundredths (1.010). If the specific gravity of the post-race urine sample is determined to be below one and one one-hundredths (1.010), a quantification of furosemide in serum or plasma shall be performed by the commission laboratory. If a horse fails to produce a urine specimen, the commission laboratory shall perform a quantification of furosemide in the serum or plasma sample. Concentrations above 100 nanograms of furosemide per milliliter of serum or plasma shall constitute a violation of this section.
  - (5) The initial cost of administering the furosemide shall be twenty (20) dollars per administration. The commission shall monitor the costs associated with administering furosemide and consult with industry representatives to determine if the cost should be

- lowered based on prevailing veterinarian services and supplies. The commission shall maintain
- 2 records documenting the basis for its determination, and if the cost is determined to be less
- than twenty (20) dollars per administration, then the commission shall lower the cost
- 4 accordingly. The cost shall be prominently posted in the racing office.
- 5 (6)(a) A two (2) year old or stakes horse shall not be administered any drug, medication
- or other substance, including furosemide, within twenty-four (24) hours of the post time of the
- 7 race in which the horse is entered. Participation by the horse shall not affect the status of the
- 8 participating horse on the official authorized bleeder medication list.
  - (b) The implementation and enforcement of the prohibition in paragraph (a) of this
- subsection shall begin on:
  - 1. January 1, 2020 for all two (2) year olds; and
- 2. January 1, 2021 for all horses entered to run in a stakes race; including the races
- comprising the Breeders' Cup World Championships and the races designated as graded stakes
- by the American Graded Stakes Committee of the Thoroughbred Owners and Breeders
- 15 Association.

- 16 (c) A concentration of furosemide greater than one and zero-tenths (1.0) nanograms per
- 17 milliliter in serum in a post-race sample shall constitute a violation of this administrative
- 18 regulation.
- 19 Section 7. Furosemide Eligibility.
- 20 (1)(a) Except as provided in Section 6(6) of this administrative regulation, a horse shall be
- 21 eligible to race with furosemide if the licensed trainer or a licensed veterinarian determines that
- it would be in the horse's best interests to race with furosemide. Notice that a horse eligible to

receive furosemide will race with or without furosemide shall be made at the time of entry to ensure public notification, including publication in the official racing program.

- (b) It shall constitute a violation of this administrative regulation if notice is made pursuant to this section that a horse will race with furosemide, and the post-race urine, serum, or plasma does not show a detectable concentration of furosemide in the post-race urine, serum, or plasma.
- (2) After a horse has been determined to no longer be required to receive furosemide, the horse shall not be eligible to receive furosemide unless the licensed trainer or a licensed veterinarian determines that it would be in the horse's best interest to race with furosemide and the licensed trainer or a licensed veterinarian complies with the requirements of this section.

Section 8. Permitted Non-steroidal Anti-inflammatory Drugs (NSAIDs).

- (1) NSAIDs shall not be administered within forty-eight (48) hours prior to post time for the race in which the horse is entered. The detection in a post-race sample of blood of a detectable concentration of an NSAID, except as allowed by subsection (2) of this section, shall constitute a violation of this administrative regulation. The detection in a post-race sample of blood of more than one (1) of phenylbutazone, flunixin, and ketoprofen in excess of the concentrations permitted by subsection (2) of this section shall constitute a violation of this administrative regulation.
- (2)(a) A finding of phenylbutazone below a concentration of three-tenths (0.3) microgram per milliliter of serum or plasma shall not constitute a violation of this section.
- (b) A finding of flunixin below a concentration of five (5) nanograms per milliliter of serum or plasma shall not constitute a violation of this section.

- 1 (c) A finding of ketoprofen below a concentration of two (2) nanograms per milliliter of 2 serum or plasma shall not constitute a violation of this section.
- 3 Section 9. Anabolic Steroids.

- (1) An exogenous AAS shall not be present in a horse that is racing. The detection of an exogenous AAS or metabolic derivative in a post-race sample shall constitute a violation of this administrative regulation.
- (2) The detection in a post-race sample of an endogenous AAS or metabolic derivative where the concentration of the AAS or metabolic derivative exceeds naturally occurring physiological levels shall constitute a violation of this administrative regulation. The following shall be deemed to be naturally occurring physiological levels:
  - (a) Boldenone:
- 1. In male horses other than geldings, free and conjugated boldenone fifteen (15) nanograms per milliliter in urine or free boldenone twenty-five (25) picograms per milliliter in serum or plasma; and
- 2. In geldings and female horses, free and conjugated boldenone one (1) nanogram per milliliter in urine or free boldenone twenty-five (25) picograms per milliliter in serum or plasma.
  - (b) Nandrolone:
- 1. In geldings, free and conjugated nandrolone one (1) nanogram per milliliter in urine or free nandrolone twenty-five (25) picograms per milliliter in serum or plasma;
- 2. In fillies and mares, free and conjugated nandrolone one (1) nanogram per milliliter in urine or free nandrolone twenty-five (25) picograms per milliliter in serum or plasma; and

- 3. In male horses other than geldings, forty-five (45) nanograms per milliliter of metabolite,  $5\alpha$ -estrane-313,  $17\alpha$ -diol in urine or a ratio in urine of  $5\alpha$ -estrane-313,  $17\alpha$ -diol of >1:1.
  - (c) Testosterone:

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- 1. In geldings, free and conjugated testosterone twenty (20) nanograms per milliliter in urine or free testosterone one hundred (100) picograms per milliliter in serum or plasma; and
- 2. In fillies and mares (unless in foal), free and conjugated testosterone fifty-five (55)
  nanograms per milliliter in urine or free testosterone one hundred (100) picograms per milliliter
  in serum or plasma.
  - (3) The gender of the horse from which a post-race biologic specimen is collected shall be identified to the commission veterinarian and the testing laboratory.
- 12 Section 10. Clenbuterol.
- 13 <u>1. Clenbuterol use is prohibited in racing and training unless the following conditions are</u>
  14 <u>met:</u>
- (a) The prescription for clenbuterol is made for a specific horse based upon a specificdiagnosis.
- (b) The veterinarian must provide a copy of the treatment sheet to the Equine Medical
   Director or his or her designee for review within twenty-four (24) hours of any administration of
   clenbuterol.
- 20 (c) A horse administered clenbuterol shall be placed on the veterinarian's list for a
  21 minimum of twenty-one (21) days after the date of last administration. The horse must meet all

- conditions for removal from the list, including blood and urine sampling taken after the twenty-
- 2 <u>one (21) day period. Both samples must have no detectable clenbuterol.</u>
- 3 (d) A horse shall not be eligible to race until it has completed all the requirements in
   4 subsection (c).
- (e) If clenbuterol is detected in a horse's post-race or out of competition sample and
  appropriate notification as outlined above was not completed, the horse shall immediately be
  placed on the veterinarian's list pending the outcome of an investigation. The horse shall be
  required to meet all conditions for removal from the veterinarian's list outlined in subsection (c),
  above.
- 10 <u>Section 11.</u> Test Barn.

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- (1) A licensed association shall provide and maintain a test barn on association grounds.
- 12 (2) The test barn shall be a fenced enclosure sufficient:
  - (a) In size and facilities to accommodate the stabling of horses temporarily detained for the taking of biologic specimens; and
    - (b) In structural design to prevent entry by unauthorized persons.
    - (3) The test barn shall be under the supervision and control of the Chief Racing Veterinarian or his or her designee, and no access to individuals other than commission personnel shall be permitted unless with the permission of the Chief Racing Veterinarian or his or her designee. If association personnel require immediate access to the test barn due to fire or other emergency, the association shall report the access to commission officials as soon as possible after the emergency.
  - Section 12[11]. Sample Collection, Testing and Reporting.

- (1) Sample collection shall be done in accordance with the procedures provided in this administrative regulation, 810 KAR 8:060, and under the instructions provided by the commission veterinarian. 3
- 4 (2) The commission veterinarian, in consultation with the commission laboratory shall determine a minimum sample requirement which shall be uniform for each horse and which shall 5 6 be separated into primary and split samples.
- 7 (3) An owner or trainer may request that a split sample be tested by a split sample 8 laboratory approved by the commission.
  - (4) The cost of testing under subsection (3) of this section, including shipping, shall be borne by the owner or trainer requesting the test.
  - (5)(a) Stable equipment other than that necessary for washing and cooling out a horse shall not be permitted in the test barn.
    - (b) Buckets and water shall be furnished by the commission veterinarian.
    - (c) If a body brace is to be used on a horse, it shall:
- 1. Be supplied by the trainer; and 15

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- 2. Applied only with the permission and in the presence of the commission veterinarian or his designee.
- (d) A licensed veterinarian may attend to a horse in the test barn only with the permission of and in the presence of the commission veterinarian or his designee.
- (6) Within five (5) business days of receipt of notification by the commission laboratory of a positive finding, the stewards and judges shall notify the owner and trainer orally or in writing of the positive finding.

- (7) The stewards or judges shall conduct a hearing as soon as possible after the conclusion of an investigation of a positive finding. A person charged with a violation may request a continuance, which the stewards or the judges may grant for good cause shown.
- Section 13[<del>12</del>]. Storage and Shipment of Split Samples.

- (1) Split samples shall be secured and made available for further testing in accordance with the procedures established in this subsection:
- (a) Split samples shall be secured in the test barn in the same manner as the primary samples for shipment to the commission laboratory, as established in Section 12[11] of this administrative regulation, until the primary samples are packed and secured for shipment to the commission laboratory. Split samples shall then be transferred to a freezer or refrigerator at a secure location approved and chosen by the commission.
- (b) A freezer or refrigerator for storage of split samples shall be equipped with a lock. The lock shall be secured to prevent access to the freezer or refrigerator at all times except as specifically provided by paragraph (c) of this subsection.
- (c) A freezer or refrigerator for storage of split samples shall be opened only for depositing or removing split samples, for inventory, or for checking the condition of samples.
- (d) A log shall be maintained by the commission veterinarian that shall be used each time a split sample freezer or refrigerator is opened to specify each person in attendance, the purpose for opening the freezer or refrigerator, identification of split samples deposited or removed, the date and time the freezer or refrigerator was opened, the time the freezer or refrigerator was closed, and verification that the lock was secured prior to and after opening of the freezer or

- refrigerator. A commission veterinarian or his designee shall be present when the freezer or refrigerator is opened.
- (e) Evidence of a malfunction of a split sample freezer or refrigerator shall be documented
   in the log.
  - (f) The commission shall be considered the owner of a split sample.

- (2)(a) A trainer or owner of a horse receiving notice of a positive finding may request that a split sample corresponding to the portion of the sample tested by the commission laboratory be sent to the split sample laboratory. The party requesting the split sample shall select a laboratory solicited and approved by the commission to perform the analysis.
  - (b) The request shall be made in writing and delivered to the stewards or judges within three (3) business days after the trainer or owner of the horse receives oral or written notice of the positive finding by the commission laboratory.
    - (c) A split sample so requested shall be shipped as expeditiously as possible.
- (3)(a) The owner or trainer requesting testing of a split sample shall be responsible for the cost of the testing, including the cost of shipping.
- (b) Failure of the owner, trainer, or a designee to appear at the time and place designated by the commission veterinarian in connection with securing, maintaining, or shipping the split sample shall constitute a waiver of any right to be present during split sample testing procedures.
  - (c) Prior to shipment of the split sample, the commission shall confirm:
- That the split sample laboratory has agreed to provide the testing requested;
- 2. That the split sample laboratory has agreed to send results to the commission; and

- 3. That arrangements for payment satisfactory to the split sample laboratory have been
   made.
- 3 Section 14[13]. Split Sample Chain of Custody.

- (1) Prior to opening the split sample freezer or refrigerator, the commission shall provide a split sample chain of custody verification form. The form to be used shall be the Split Sample Chain of Custody Form. The form shall be fully completed during the retrieval, packaging, and shipment of the split sample and shall contain the following information:
  - (a) The date and time the sample is removed from the split sample freezer or refrigerator;
    - (b) The sample number; and
    - (c) The address where the split sample is to be sent.
  - (2) A split sample shall be removed from the split sample freezer or refrigerator by a commission employee after notice to the owner, trainer, or designee thereof and a commission-designated representative shall pack the split sample for shipment in accordance with the packaging procedures directed by the commission. The Split Sample Chain of Custody Form shall be signed by both the owner's representative, if present, and the commission representative to confirm the proper packaging of the split sample for shipment. The exterior of the package shall be secured and sealed to prevent tampering with the package.
  - (3) The owner, trainer, or designee, if present, may inspect the package containing the split sample immediately prior to transfer to the delivery carrier to verify that the package is intact and has not been tampered with.
- (4) The Split Sample Chain of Custody Form shall be completed and signed by the representative of the commission and the owner, trainer, or designee, if present.

- 1 (5) The commission representative shall retain the original Split Sample Chain of Custody
- 2 Form and provide a copy to the owner, trainer, or designee, if requested.
- Section 15[14]. Medical Labeling. 3
- (1) A drug or medication that, by federal or state law, requires a prescription shall not 4
- be used or kept on association grounds unless validly prescribed by a duly licensed veterinarian. 5
- (2) A drug or medication shall bear a prescription label that is securely attached and 6
- clearly ascribed to show the following: 7
- 8 (a) The name of the product;

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- (b) The name, address, and telephone number of the veterinarian prescribing or 9 dispensing the product; 10
  - (c) The name of the horse for which the product is intended or prescribed;
- (d) The dosage, duration of treatment, and expiration date of the prescribed or dispensed 12 13 product; and
- (e) The name of the trainer to whom the product was dispensed. 14
- Section <u>16[15]</u>. Trainer Responsibility. 15
  - (1) In the absence of substantial evidence to the contrary, a trainer shall be responsible for the condition of a horse in his or her care.
- (2) In the absence of substantial evidence to the contrary, a trainer shall be responsible for the presence of a prohibited drug, medication, substance, or metabolic derivative, including permitted medication in excess of the maximum allowable concentration, in a horse in his or her 20 care.

- (3) A trainer shall prevent the administration of a drug, medication, substance, or metabolic derivative that may constitute a violation of this administrative regulation.
  - (4) A trainer whose horse has been claimed shall remain responsible for a violation of this administrative regulation regarding that horse's participation in the race in which the horse is claimed.
- 6 (5) A trainer shall be responsible for:

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- (a) Maintaining the assigned stable area in a clean, neat, and sanitary condition at all times;
- 8 (b) Using the services of those veterinarians licensed by the commission to attend to
  9 horses that are on association grounds;
- 10 (c) The proper identity, custody, care, health, condition, and safety of horses in his or her
  11 care;
  - (d) Promptly reporting the alteration of the sex of a horse to the horse identifier and the racing secretary;
  - (e) Promptly reporting to the racing secretary and the commission veterinarian if a posterior digital neurectomy (heel nerving) is performed on a horse in his or her care and ensuring this fact is designated on its certificate of registration;
  - (f) Promptly reporting to the racing secretary the name of a mare in his or her care that has been bred and is entered to race;
- 19 (g) Promptly notifying the commission veterinarian of a reportable disease or 20 communicable illness in a horse in his or her care;
  - (h) Promptly reporting the serious injury or death of a horse in his or her care at a location under the jurisdiction of the commission to the stewards or judges and the commission

- veterinarian and ensuring compliance with Section 23[22] of this administrative regulation and
- 2 810 KAR 4:010, Section 14, governing postmortem examinations;

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- 3 (i) Complying with the medication and recordkeeping requirements in subsection (6) of 4 this section;
  - (j) Promptly notifying the stewards or judges and the commission veterinarian if the trainer has knowledge or reason to believe that there has been an administration to a horse of a drug, medication, or other substance prohibited by this administrative regulation or has knowledge or reason to believe that a prohibited practice has occurred as established in Section 21[20] of this administrative regulation;
    - (k) Ensuring the fitness of every horse in his or her care to perform creditably at the distance entered;
  - (I) Ensuring that every horse he or she has entered to race is present at its assigned stall for a pre-race soundness inspection as prescribed by 810 KAR 2:010, Section 4(1)(I);
    - (m) Ensuring proper bandages, equipment, and shoes;
  - (n) Ensuring the horse's presence in the paddock at the time prescribed by racing officials before the race in which the horse is entered;
  - (o) Personally attending in the paddock and supervising the saddling or preparation of a horse in his or her care, unless an assistant trainer fulfills these duties or the trainer is excused by the judges or stewards pursuant to 810 KAR 4:100, Section 3(2)(f); and
- 20 (p) Attending the collection of a biologic specimen taken from a horse in his or her care 21 or delegating a licensed employee or the owner to do so.

- 1 (6)(a) A trainer shall maintain a clear and accurate record of any treatment administered 2 to a horse in his or her care.
- (b) A trainer shall ensure the transfer of copies of all medical records to the subsequent
   owner and trainer of a horse.
- (c) Failure to comply with this subsection may result in the imposition of penalties pursuant to 810 KAR 8:030.
- 7 (d) The stewards and judges may at any time require presentation of a horse's medical records.
- 9 Section <u>17</u>[<del>16</del>]. Licensed Veterinarians.

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- (1) A veterinarian licensed by the commission and practicing at a location under the jurisdiction of the commission shall be considered under the supervision of the commission veterinarian and the stewards or judges.
- (2) A veterinarian shall report to the stewards, judges or the commission veterinarian a violation of this administrative regulation by a licensee.
- 15 Section <u>18[17]</u>. Veterinary Reports.
  - (1) A veterinarian who treats a horse at a location under the jurisdiction of the commission shall submit a Veterinary Report of Horses Treated to be Submitted Daily form to the commission veterinarian containing the following information:
    - (a) The name of the horse treated;
- 20 (b) The type and dosage of drug or medication administered or prescribed;
- 21 (c) The name of the trainer of the horse;
- 22 (d) The date and time of treatment; and

- 1 (e) Other pertinent treatment information requested by the commission veterinarian.
- (2) The Veterinary Report of Horses Treated to be Submitted Daily form shall be signed
   by the treating practicing veterinarian.
  - (3) The Veterinary Report of Horses Treated to be Submitted Daily form shall be on file not later than the time prescribed on the next race day by the commission veterinarian.
  - (4) The Veterinary Report of Horses Treated to be Submitted Daily form shall be confidential, and its content shall not be disclosed except in the course of an investigation of a possible violation of this administrative regulation or in a proceeding before the stewards, judges or the commission, or to the trainer or owner of record at the time of treatment.
  - (5) A timely and accurate filing of a Veterinary Report of Horses Treated to be Submitted Daily form by the veterinarian or his designee that is consistent with the analytical results of a positive test reported by the commission laboratory may be used as a mitigating factor in determining the appropriate penalties pursuant to 810 KAR 8:030.
  - (6) A veterinarian having knowledge or reason to believe that a horse entered in a race has received a drug, medication, or substance prohibited under this administrative regulation or has knowledge or reason to believe that a prohibited practice has occurred as established in Section 21[20] of this administrative regulation shall report this fact immediately to the commission veterinarian or to the stewards or judges.
  - (7) A practicing veterinarian shall maintain records of all horses treated and of all medications sold or dispensed. The records shall include:
    - (a) The name of the horse;
  - (b) The trainer of the horse;

- 1 (c) The date, time, amount, and type of medication administered;
- 2 (d) The drug or compound administered;
- 3 (e) The method of administration; and
- 4 (f) The diagnosis.

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- 5 (8) The records shall be retained for at least sixty (60) days after the horse has raced and 6 shall be available for inspection by the commission.
- 7 Section 19[18]. Veterinarian's List.
- (1) The commission veterinarian shall maintain a list of horses determined to be unfit to compete in a race due to illness, physical distress, unsoundness, infirmity, or other medical condition.
  - (2) A horse may be removed from the veterinarian's list when, in the opinion of the commission veterinarian, the horse is capable of competing in a race.
  - (3) The commission shall maintain a bleeder list of all horses that have demonstrated external evidence of exercise-induced pulmonary hemorrhage during or after a race or workout as observed by the commission veterinarian.
  - (4) Every horse that is a confirmed bleeder, regardless of age, shall be placed on the bleeder list and be ineligible to participate in a race (betting or non-betting), qualifying race, time trial, or for the following time periods:
- 19 (a) First incident fourteen (14) days;
- 20 (b) Second incident within a 365-day period thirty (30) days;
- 21 (c) Third incident within a 365-day period 180 days; and
- 22 (d) Fourth incident within a 365-day period barred from racing for life.

(5) For the purpose of counting the number of days a horse is ineligible to run, the day after the horse bled externally shall be the first day of the recovery period.

- (6) The voluntary administration of furosemide without an external bleeding incident shall not subject a horse to the initial period of ineligibility as established in this section.
  - Section 20[19]. Distribution of Purses, Barn Searches, and Retention of Samples.
- (7) For all races, purse money in thoroughbred and other flat racing shall be paid or distributed pursuant to the process provided in 810 KAR 2:070, Section 27(3), and in standardbred racing, no later than twenty-four (24) hours after notice from the commission that a final laboratory report has been issued.
- (8) The distribution of purse money prior to the issuance of a final laboratory report shall not be considered a finding that no prohibited drug, medication, substance, or metabolic derivative has been administered to a horse.
- (9) After the commission laboratory issues a positive finding the executive director of the commission or the stewards or judges may authorize and execute an investigation into the circumstances surrounding the incident that is the subject of the positive finding.
- (10) If the purse money has been distributed, the stewards or judges shall order the money returned immediately to the association upon notification from the commission laboratory that a prohibited drug, medication, substance, or metabolic derivative was administered to a horse eligible for purse money.
- (11) At the conclusion of testing by the commission laboratory and split sample laboratory, the remaining portion of the samples at the commission laboratory and split samples remaining at the test barn may be retained at a proper temperature at a secure facility approved

- and chosen by the commission. If a report indicating a positive finding has been issued, the
- 2 commission shall use its best reasonable efforts to retain any remaining portion of the sample
- 3 until legal proceedings have concluded. The commission may freeze samples.
- 4 Section <u>21</u>[<del>20</del>]. Other Prohibited Practices Constituting a Violation of this Administrative
- 5 Regulation.
- 6 (1) A drug, medication, substance, or device shall not be possessed or used by a licensee,
- or his designee or agent, within a nonpublic area at a location under the jurisdiction of the
- 8 commission:
- 9 (a) The use of which may endanger the health and welfare of the horse; or
- 10 (b) The use of which may endanger the safety of the rider or driver.
- 11 (2) Without the prior permission of the commission or its designee, a drug, medication,
- or substance that has never been approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration
- (USFDA) for use in humans or animals shall not be possessed or used at a location under the
- 14 jurisdiction of the commission. The commission shall determine whether to grant prior
- permission after consultation with the Equine Drug Research Council.
- 16 (3) The following blood-doping agents shall not be possessed or used at a location under
- the jurisdiction of the commission:
- 18 (a) Erythropoietin;
- 19 (b) Darbepoietin;
- 20 (c) Oxyglobin;
- 21 (d) Hemopure; or
- (e) Any substance that abnormally enhances the oxygenation of body tissue.

- 1 (4) A treatment, procedure, or therapy shall not be practiced, administered, or applied 2 that may:
  - (a) Endanger the health or welfare of a horse; or
- 4 (b) Endanger the safety of a rider or driver.

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- (5) Extracorporeal Shock Wave Therapy or Radial Pulse Wave Therapy shall not be used
   unless the conditions established in this subsection are met.
  - (a) A treated horse shall not race for a minimum of ten (10) days following treatment.
  - (b) A veterinarian licensed to practice by the commission shall administer the treatment.
  - (c) The commission veterinarian shall be notified prior to the delivery of the machine on association grounds.
  - (d) Prior to administering the treatment, a report shall be submitted by the veterinarian administering the treatment to the commission veterinarian on the Veterinary Report of Horses

    Treated with Extracorporeal Shock Wave Therapy or Radial Pulse Wave Therapy.
  - (6) Other than furosemide, an alkalizing substance that could alter the serum or plasma pH or concentration of bicarbonates or carbon dioxide in a horse shall not be used within twenty-four (24) hours prior to post time of the race in which the horse is entered.
  - (7) Without the prior permission of the commission veterinarian or his designee, based on standard veterinary practice for recognized conditions, a nasogastric tube which is longer than six (6) inches shall not be used for the administration of any substance within twenty-four (24) hours prior to post time of the race in which the horse is entered.
  - (8) A serum or plasma total carbon dioxide (TCO2) level shall not exceed thirty-seven (37.0) millimoles per liter; except, a violation shall not exist if the TCO2 level is found to be normal

- for the horse following the quarantine procedure established in Section <u>22[21]</u> of this administrative regulation.
  - (9) A blood gas machine shall not be possessed or used by a person other than an authorized representative of the commission at a location under the jurisdiction of the commission.
  - (10) A shock wave therapy machine or radial pulse wave therapy machine shall not be possessed or used by anyone other than a veterinarian licensed by the commission at a location under the jurisdiction of the commission.
- 9 Section 22[21]. TCO2 Testing and Procedures.

- (1)(a) The stewards, judges, or commission veterinarian may order the pre-race or post-race collection of blood specimens from a horse to determine the total carbon dioxide concentration in the serum or plasma of the horse. The winning horse and other horses, as selected by the stewards or judges, may be tested in each race to determine if there has been a violation of this administrative regulation.
- (b) Pre-race sampling shall be done at a reasonable time, place, and manner directed by the chief state steward in consultation with the commission veterinarian.
- (c) A specimen consisting of at least two (2) blood tubes shall be taken from a horse to determine the TCO2 concentration in the serum or plasma of the horse. If the commission laboratory determines that the TCO2 level exceeds thirty-seven (37.0) millimoles per liter plus the laboratory's measurement of uncertainty, the executive director of the commission shall be informed of the positive finding.

(d) Split sample testing for TCO2 may be requested by an owner or trainer in advance of the collection of the specimen by the commission veterinarian; however, the collection and testing of a split sample for TCO2 testing shall be done at a reasonable time, place, and manner directed by the commission veterinarian.

- (e) The cost of split sample testing, including the cost of shipping, shall be borne by the owner or the trainer.
- (2)(a) If the level of TCO2 is determined to exceed thirty-seven (37.0) millimoles per liter plus the laboratory's measurement of uncertainty and the licensed owner or trainer of the horse certifies in writing to the stewards or judges within twenty-four (24) hours after the notification of the test result that the level is normal for that horse, the owner or trainer may request that the horse be held in quarantine. If quarantine is requested, the licensed association shall make guarded quarantine available for that horse for a period of time to be determined by the steward or judges, but in no event for more than seventy-two (72) hours.
  - (b) The expense for maintaining the quarantine shall be borne by the owner or trainer.
- (c) During quarantine, the horse shall be retested periodically by the commission veterinarian.
  - (d) The horse shall not be permitted to race during a quarantine period, but it may be exercised and trained at times prescribed by the licensed association and in a manner that allows monitoring of the horse by a commission representative.
    - (e) During quarantine, the horse shall be fed only hay, oats, and water.
  - (f) If the commission veterinarian is satisfied that the horse's level of TCO2, as registered in the original test, is physiologically normal for that horse, the stewards or judges:

- 1. Shall permit the horse to race; and
- 2. May require repetition of the quarantine procedure established in paragraphs (a)
- through (f) of this subsection to reestablish that the horse's TCO2 level is physiologically normal.
- 4 Section <u>23[<del>22</del></u>]. Postmortem Examination.
- (1) A horse that dies or is euthanized on the grounds of a licensed association or training center under the jurisdiction of the commission shall undergo a postmortem examination at the discretion of the commission and at a facility designated by the commission, through its designee, as provided in 810 KAR 4:010, Section 14.
  - (2) The commission shall bear the cost of an autopsy that is required by the commission.
  - (3) The presence of a prohibited drug, medication, substance, or metabolic derivative thereof in a specimen collected during the postmortem examination of a horse may constitute a violation of this administrative regulation.
- 13 Section <u>24[23]</u>. Corticosteroids.

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- (1) A corticosteroid shall not be administered intra-articularly within fourteen (14) days before post time for the race in which the horse is entered.
- (2) The presence of a detectable concentration of more than one (1) corticosteroid in a post-race sample of blood, urine, or any combination of blood and urine shall constitute a violation of this section.

# Kentucky Horse Racing Commission Withdrawal Guidelines Thoroughbred; Standardbred; Quarter Horse, Appaloosa, and Arabian KHRC 8-020-2 (04/2020)



#### **General Notice**

These withdrawal guidelines do not apply to 2-year-old or stakes horses pursuant to 810 KAR 8:010 Section 6. 2-year-olds beginning in 2020 or stakes horses beginning in 2021 "shall not be administered any drug, medication, or other substance, including furosemide, within twenty-four (24) hours of the post time of the race in which the horse is entered." (emphasis added)

Unless otherwise specified in these withdrawal guidelines or the applicable regulations and statutes, the following withdrawal guidelines are voluntary and advisory. The guidelines are recommendations based on current scientific knowledge that may change over time. A licensee may present evidence of full compliance with these guidelines to the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission (the "Commission" or "KHRC") and the stewards as a mitigating factor to be used in determining violations and penalties.

These withdrawal interval guidelines assume that administration of medications will be performed at doses that are not greater than the manufacturer's maximum recommended dosage, or the dosage recommended in this document. Medications administered at dosages above manufacturer's recommendations, in compounded formulations and/or in combination with other medications and/or administration inside the withdrawal interval may result in test sample concentrations above threshold concentrations that could lead to positive test results and the imposition of penalties. The time of administration of an orally administered substance, for the purposes of withdrawal interval, shall be considered to be the time of complete ingestion of the medication by the horse via eating or drinking. Brand names of medications, where applicable, are listed in parentheses or brackets following the generic name of a drug.

In addition to the requirements contained in KRS Chapter 13A, the KHRC shall give notice of an amendment or addition to these withdrawal guidelines by posting the change on the KHRC website and at all Kentucky racetracks at least two weeks before the amendment or addition takes legal effect.

### Withdrawal Guidelines

1) Furosemide shall be administered pursuant to 810 KAR 8:010.

- 2) The following substances may be administered or applied up to the scheduled paddock time of the race in which the horse is to compete:
  - Topical applications such as liniments, leg paints, salves, and ointments which
    may contain antibiotics or DMSO, but do not contain steroids, anesthetics, or
    any other prohibited substances.
- 3) The following substances may be administered up to 24 hours prior to the scheduled post time of the race in which the horse is to compete as long as their use follows the general notice on page 1 of these withdrawal guidelines:
  - Antibiotics (except those containing prohibited drugs such as Procaine);
  - Antiprotozoals (e.g., ponazuril [Marquis] toltrazuril [Baycox], sulfamethoxazole/pyrimethamine [Daraprim], etc.);
  - Antifungal Agents (specifically Griseofulvin and Ketoconazole);
  - Certain Inhalation Agents (specifically cromolyn sodium [Intal], and acetylcysteine [Mucomyst]) that do not exhibit bronchodilator properties;
  - Cimetadine (Tagamet), orally at 20 mg/kg twice daily for 7 doses;
  - Electrolytes, Vitamins and Minerals (IV, IM or oral), and/or other oral supplements/nutrients not containing drugs;
  - Hyaluronic Acid (Legend) IV;
  - Misoprostol;
  - Non-Androgenic Reproductive Hormones (HCG, Regumate, GnRH, etc.), in fillies and mares only;
  - Omeprazole (Gastrogard®), orally at 2.2 g once daily for 4 days;
  - Polysulfated glycosaminoglycan (Adequan) IM;
  - Proprionibacterium acnes suspension (Eqstim), or comparable immunostimulants, excluding levamisole;
  - Ranitidine (Zantac), orally at 8 mg/kg twice daily for 7 doses; and
  - Sucralfate
- 4) Non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDS):
  - A) ELECTED NSAID: The applicable regulations require compliance with the following: only one of the following three NSAIDS may be administered up to the manufacturer's maximum labeled dosage until 48 hours prior to the scheduled post time of the race in which the horse is to compete as long as their use follows the general notice on page 1 of these withdrawal guidelines and the requirements of 810 KAR 8:010.
    - Phenylbutazone (Butazolidin) 4.4 mg/kg (Intravenous Only)
    - Flunixin Meglumine (Banamine) 1.1 mg/kg (Intravenous Only)

- Ketoprofen (Ketofen) 2.2 mg/kg (Intravenous Only).
- B) The following withdrawal intervals shall be observed for all NSAIDS, except for the one selected in 4A above, for administration prior to the scheduled post time of the race in which the horse is to compete as long as their use follows the general notice on page 1 of these minimum withdrawal guidelines:

Flunixin Meglumine (Banamine) 1.1 mg/kg IV 6 days\*\*\*
 Phenylbutazone (Butazolidin) 4.4 mg/kg IV 7 days\*\*\*
 Ketoprofen (Ketofen) 2.2 mg/kg IV 4 days\*\*\*
 Diclofenac Sodium Topical (Surpass® Cream) 7 days\*\*\*
 Single 5" application

Firocoxib (Equioxx) 0.1 mg/kg

Single oral or IV dose

Repeated daily administration 15 days\*\*\*

- 5) A) The following substances have a 48 hour withdrawal guidance prior to the scheduled post time of the race in which the horse is to compete as long as their use follows the general notice on page 1 of these withdrawal guidelines:
  - Acepromazine (Promace) IV at 0.05 mg/kg;
  - Butorphanol (Torbugesic) IV at 0.1 mg/kg;
  - Cetirizine (Zyrtec) orally at 0.4 mg/kg twice daily for 5 doses. NOTE: Do not administer ivermectin within 48 hours of a race if horse has been administered cetirizine.
  - Dantrolene (Dantrium) oral at 500 mg total dose;
  - Detomidine (Dormosedan) IV, 5 mg single dose;
  - DMSO IV, oral, topical up to 60 ml;
  - Glycopyrrolate (Robinol) IV, 1 mg total dose;
  - Guaifenesin, orally at 2 g twice daily for 5 doses;
  - Methocarbamol (Robaxin-V)—Single IV at 15 mg/kg;
  - \*Procaine penicillin IM at 17 mg/kg; and
  - Xylazine (Rompun)—IV, 200 mg single dose
  - B) The following substances shall not be administered within 48 hours of a race:
  - Beta-2 agonists by inhalation (terbutaline, salmeterol, fenoterol);
  - Ergot alkaloids (Ergonovine, Methergine, etc.);
  - Ipratopium;
  - Isoxsuprine; and
  - Pentoxyphylline (Trental)

- 6) The following substances may be administered up to 72 hours prior to the scheduled post time of the race in which the horse is to compete as long as their use follows the general notice on page 1 of these withdrawal guidelines:
  - Albuterol (Proventil) via inhalation at 720 mcg;
  - Dexamethasone (Azium) oral, IV, IM at 0.05 mg/kg, if another corticosteroid was administered systemically or intra-articularly, this withdrawal guidance does not apply and a minimum 5 day withdrawal is recommended;
  - Lidocaine subcutaneous at 200 mg total dose;
  - Mepivacaine (Carbocaine) Subcutaneous at 0.07 mg/kg;
  - Romifidine (Sedivet) 50 mg IV dose.
- 7) The following substances may be administered up to 96 hours prior to the scheduled post time of the race in which the horse is to compete as long as their use follows the general notice on page 1 of these withdrawal guidelines:
  - Hydroxyzine (Atarax);
  - Phenytoin (Dilantin).
- 8) The following substances may be administered up to 7 days prior to the scheduled post time of the race in which the horse is to compete as long as their use follows the general notice on page 1 of these withdrawal guidelines:
  - Fluphenazine Decanoate (Prolixin);
  - Reserpine (Serpasil); and
- 9) The use of an extra corporeal shock wave therapy or radial pulse wave therapy machine must be done under current KHRC regulations and may be performed until 10 days prior to the scheduled post time of the race in which the horse is to compete.
- 10) The following substance may be administered up to 21[14] days prior to the scheduled post time, of the race in which the horse is to compete as long as (1) its use follows the general notice on page 1 of these withdrawal guidelines, and (2) its use complies with 810 KAR 1:010 Section 10:
  - Clenbuterol (Ventipulmin) orally up to 0.8 mcg/kg twice daily.
- 11) Any horse that has been treated with therapeutic medications found in sections 6 through 10 of this document may, at the trainer's request and expense, and on permission of the Commission veterinarian, have samples of blood and/or urine collected by the Commission veterinarian for analysis by the Commission authorized laboratory prior to entry to race in the

state of Kentucky. As a condition of this elective testing, the trainer will be required to disclose the date and time, dose, and route of administration of the substance for which clearance testing is requested. A report from the commission laboratory of a negative finding in this pre-race, elective testing does not provide a safe harbor for the owner, trainer, veterinarian or horse. A report from the commission laboratory of a positive finding in a post-race sample shall be treated as a violation of KHRC regulations even if there was a negative finding by the commission laboratory in the clearance testing sample.

- 12) The following have a 14 day stand down period for intra-articular injection (IA). Any IA corticosteroid injection within 14 days is a violation:
  - Betamethasone-Intra-articular (IA) at 9 mg total dose in a single articular space;
     NOTE: Withdrawal time should be increased for use of betamethasone products with a ratio of >1:1 betamethasone acetate to betamethasone sodium phosphate. Intramuscular administration is associated with substantially longer withdrawal times.
  - Isoflupredone (Predef 2x)—IA at 20 mg in a single joint space or 10 mg subcutaneous.
  - Methyprednisolone (Depo-Medrol)—IA at a total dose of less than 100 mg in a single articular space;

**NOTE:** Intramuscular administration is associated with substantially longer withdrawal times and is not recommended. The RMTC study administered 100 mg to a single joint. Concentrations in 2 of the 16 study horses did not fall below 100 pg until 10 days post administration. Clearance testing is recommended in blood and urine prior to entry.

- Triamcinolone acetonide (Vetalog)—IA at 9 mg total dose in a single articular space.
   NOTE: Intramuscular administration is associated with substantially longer withdrawal times.

- NECESSITY, FUNCTION, AND CONFORMITY: KRS 230.215(2) grants the commission the authority to regulate conditions under which horse racing shall be conducted in Kentucky. KRS 230.240(2) requires the commission to promulgate administrative regulations restricting or prohibiting the use and administration of drugs or stimulants or other improper acts to horses prior to the horse participating in a race. This administrative regulation establishes new sampling and testing procedures for prohibited substances, and establishes penalties for individuals found to be in violation of this administrative regulation.
- Section 1. Definitions.
- 16 (1) "Endogenous" means a substance that is naturally produced by the healthy body.
- 17 (2) "Exogenous" means a substance that is not naturally produced by the healthy body.
- 18 (3) "Out of competition testing" means all testing other than:
- 19 (a) Pre-race TCO2 testing; and
- 20 (b) Post-race testing at a licensed association under the jurisdiction of the commission.

- (4) "Sample" means that portion of a specimen subjected to testing by the commission
   laboratory.
- 3 (5) "Sampling" means the act of collecting a specimen from a horse.
- 4 (6) "Specimen" means blood, urine, or other biologic matter taken or drawn from a borse for testing.
- 6 Section 2. Prohibited Substances and Practices.

- (1) All substances identified in this administrative regulation shall be prohibited unless specifically permitted. A positive finding by the commission laboratory of a substance prohibited by this administrative regulation in a specimen taken from a horse designated for testing by a commission veterinarian or his designee shall be prima facie evidence that a violation has occurred. Any reference to substances in this section does not alter the requirements for testing concentrations in race day samples established in 810 KAR 8:010 and 810 KAR 8:050.
- (2) Any pharmacological substance not addressed by this administrative regulation and without current approval by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for human or veterinary use shall be prohibited at all times without prior approval of the commission. If a veterinarian seeks approval to use a pharmacological substance not currently approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, the commission or its designee may consult with the Association of Racing Commissioners International, the Racing and Medication Testing Consortium, or their successors to determine whether to authorize use of the substance.
- (3) Therapeutic substances not otherwise prohibited by this administrative regulation may be used if the substances:

- 1 (a) Are currently approved for human or veterinary use by the U.S. Food and Drug 2 Administration; and
- 3 (b) Are prescribed and administered in the context of a valid veterinarian-client-patient4 relationship.
- (4) Compounded medications not otherwise prohibited by this administrative regulation

  - (23) Polymers of nucleic acids or nucleic acid analogues shall not be transferred unless prior approval is requested and received from the commission or its designee.
    - (24) The use of normal or genetically modified hematopoietic cells shall be prohibited.

1 1. Entered by the veterinarian in the horse's medical record, which record shall be made 2 available to a designee of the commission upon request 3 2. Pursuant to a valid veterinary prescription; and 3. Reported to the commission's representative at the time of sampling. 4 5 Section 3. Out-of-Competition Testing. 6 (1) Any horse eligible to race in Kentucky shall be subject to testing without advance 7 notice for the substances specified in Section 2 of this administrative regulation. A horse shall 8 be presumed eligible to race in Kentucky if: 9 (a) It is under the care, custody, or control of a trainer licensed by the commission; (b) It is owned by an owner licensed by the commission; 10 11 (c) It is nominated to a race at an association licensed pursuant to KRS 230.300; 12 (d) It has raced at an association licensed pursuant to KRS 230.300 within the previous 13 twelve (12) calendar months; 14 (e) It is stabled on the grounds of an association licensed pursuant to KRS 230.300 or a 15 training facility subject to the jurisdiction of the commission; or 16 (f) It is nominated to participate in the Kentucky Thoroughbred Development Fund, the 17 Kentucky Standardbred Development Fund, or the Kentucky quarter horse, paint horse, 18 Appaloosa and Arabian Development Fund. 19 (2) A horse subject to testing under subsection (1) of this section may be designated for 20 testing by the executive director, the chief state steward, chief judge, or their respective

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designee.

- 1 (3) An owner, trainer, or any authorized designee shall fully cooperate with the commission veterinarian, or his or her designee, by:
  - (a) Locating and identifying any horse designated for out-of-competition testing;
  - (b) Making the horse available for the collection of the specimen at a place designated by the commission veterinarian, or his or her designee; and
  - (c) Observing the collection of the specimen.

- 1. If the owner, trainer or their authorized designee, is not available to observe the collection of the specimen, the collection shall be deferred until the trainer, owner, or their authorized designee, becomes reasonably available, but the collection shall occur no later than six (6) hours after notice of intent to collect a specimen from a horse is issued by the commission veterinarian or his or her designee.
- 2. If the collection does not occur within the time provided for in this subsection, any horse that is designated for testing may be barred from racing in Kentucky and placed on the veterinarian's list, pursuant to 810 KAR 8:010, Section 17, and the steward's list or judges' list, for a period of 180 days and the owner and trainer of the horse may be subject to the penalties described in Section 8 of this administrative regulation.
  - (4) Responsible persons.
- (a) The trainer of the horse shall be responsible for the condition of a horse sampled for an out-of-competition test while on the grounds of a licensed training facility or racetrack.
- (b) If the horse is sampled while not on the grounds of a licensed training facility or racetrack, the owner shall be presumed to be the responsible person unless the owner can

- establish, by substantial evidence, that another licensed person had accepted the responsibility for the care, custody, and control of the horse, making that person the responsible person.
  - (c) If a horse sampled for an out-of-competition test was claimed, sold, or otherwise transferred during the time the substance giving rise to the positive test may have been administered, then the commission shall investigate to determine, by a preponderance of the evidence, the identity of the responsible person at the time the substance may have been administered.
  - (d) If the commission cannot determine a responsible person, then the commission may deem the owner responsible and may place the horse on the veterinarian's list for as long as is necessary to protect the integrity of racing.
  - (e) If a horse designated for testing is sampled at a location not under the jurisdiction of the commission, the trainer or his designee may declare at the time of sampling any reportable substances that have been administered to the horse but have not previously been disclosed to the commission.
    - Section 4. Specimen Collection.

- (1) A specimen shall be collected from any horse designated by the executive director, the chief state steward, the presiding judge, or their designee, whether the horse is located in Kentucky or in another jurisdiction.
- (2) If a designated horse is located in another jurisdiction, the executive director or commission veterinarian may select a veterinarian from that jurisdiction's racing commission or regulatory entity to collect the specimen.

- (3) At a licensed association or training facility under the jurisdiction of the commission, the commission veterinarian, or his or her designee, may collect a specimen from a horse designated for testing at any time.
- (4) At a location other than the grounds of a licensed association or a training facility under the jurisdiction of the commission, the commission veterinarian, or his or her designee, shall collect the specimen between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m., prevailing time, and shall notify orally or in writing the owner, trainer, or their designee before arriving to collect the specimen.
- (5) A licensed association or training facility under the jurisdiction of the commission at which a horse designated for testing is located shall cooperate fully in the collection of the specimen.
- Section 5. Minimum and split samples.

- The commission veterinarian, in consultation with the official laboratory, shall determine minimum and split sample requirements as established at 810 KAR 8:010, Section 11.
  - Section 6. Sample Storage and Testing.
- (1) Any out of competition sample collected pursuant to this administrative regulation shall be stored in a temperature controlled unit at a secure location chosen by the commission until the sample is submitted for testing. The samples shall be secured under conditions established by the commission veterinarian in accordance with 810 KAR 8:010, Section 11.
- (2) The commission is the owner of an out of competition specimen. (3) A trainer or owner of a horse receiving notice of a report of finding from the commission may request that a

- split sample corresponding to the portion of the sample tested by the commission laboratory
  be sent to a split sample laboratory which has documented its proficiency in detecting the
- 3 substance associated with the report of finding and has been approved by the commission.
  - (4) Split samples shall be subject to 810 KAR 8:010, Section 11, and the chain of custody of any split sample shall be maintained in accordance with 810 KAR 8:010, Section 12.
  - (5) The cost of testing a split sample, including shipping, shall be borne by the owner or trainer requesting the test.
- 8 Section 7. Notice of Violation and Hearing.
  - Within five (5) business days of receipt by the stewards or judges of notification of a violation of this administrative regulation, the stewards or judges shall notify the owner and trainer orally or in writing of the violation and shall schedule a stewards' or judges' hearing within fourteen (14) calendar days of notification by the stewards or judges to the owner and trainer. The hearing may be continued if the stewards or judges determine a continuation is necessary to accommodate the parties.
- 15 Section 8. Penalty.

- A trainer, owner, responsible person, or any other individual who violates this administrative regulation shall be subject to the following penalties:
- (1) A positive finding of a substance prohibited by this administrative regulation shall be subject to the penalties for that substance established in 810 KAR 8:010, 810 KAR 8:020, and 810 KAR 8:030.
- (2) If the owner, trainer, or any authorized designee fails to cooperate or otherwise prevents a horse from being tested, the horse designated for testing shall be barred from racing

- in Kentucky and placed on the veterinarian's list, pursuant to 810 KAR 8:010, Section 17, and
  the steward's list or judges' list, for 180 days, and the individual or individuals responsible for
  the failure to cooperate or prevention of the horse from being tested shall be subject to the
  - (3) A horse that is barred from racing in Kentucky and placed on the Veterinarian's List and the steward's list, or judges' list pursuant to subsection (4)(c) or subsection (5) of this section shall remain barred from racing and shall remain on the veterinarian's list and the steward's list or judge's list:
  - (a) Upon sale or transfer of the horse to another owner or trainer until the expiration of 180 days; and
  - (b) Until the horse is determined by the commission to test negative for any substance prohibited by this administrative regulation and is approved for racing by the commission veterinarian and the chief state steward or presiding judge.
  - (4)(a) Willful failure to make a horse available for sampling, tampering with or attempting to tamper in order to alter the integrity and validity of a sample, including urine substitution or adulteration, or any other deceptive acts or interference in the sampling process, shall be penalized as follows:
    - 1. For a first offense, a Class A penalty as established in 810 KAR 8:030; or
- 19 2. For a second offense, permanent license revocation.

penalties established in subsection (4) of this section.

(b) A horse that is not produced for out of competition testing shall be placed on the Veterinarian's List for a minimum of 180 days.

- 1 (5) Failure to report treatment as required by this administrative regulation shall be 2 penalized as follows:
  - (a) For a first offense, a warning; or

- 4 (b) For a second or subsequent offense, a Class D penalty as established in 810 KAR 5 8:030.
  - (6) Upon finding a violation of this administrative regulation, the horse in which the presence of a substance described in Section 2 of this administrative regulation was detected shall be barred from racing in Kentucky and placed on the veterinarian's list pursuant to 810 KAR 8:010, Section 17, and the stewards' or judges' list, for a period of up to 180 days and shall remain barred from racing in Kentucky until the horse is determined by the commission to test negative for any substance described in Section 2 of this administrative regulation and is approved for racing by the commission veterinarian and the chief state steward or presiding judge.
  - (7) Upon finding a violation of this administrative regulation, the horse in which the presence of a substance described in Section 2 of this administrative regulation was detected shall remain subject to the requirements of subsection (4) of this section:
  - (a) Upon sale or transfer of the horse to another owner or trainer before the expiration of 180 days; and
  - (b) Until the horse is determined by the commission to test negative for any substance described in Section 2 of this administrative regulation and is approved for racing by the commission veterinarian and the chief state steward or presiding judge.
